### Lloyd Library Has New Website

The Lloyd Library and Museum is pleased to announce important additions and enhancements to its website. New features include databases never before available and now accessed only on our website. They are the Eclectic Medical Journal Index, created by the Lloyd Staff, and Pharmacists in World War II. created and maintained by Lloyd Scholar. Dennis Worthen, in conjunction with his book. Pharmacy in World War II. The Eclectic Medical Journal Index is the only one available for this Cincinnati publication and indexes its entire run of 97 volumes published from 1849 to 1937. Pharmacists in World War II includes over 11,000 pharmacists, pharmacy students, and those returning from the military on the GI Bill.

Also new is our first online exhibit-a virtual representation of the Lloyd's successful 2003-2004 exhibit. Mining the Lloyd: Book Artists Reveal Secrets and Treasures from the Lloyd Library and Museum. The Lloyd collaborated with local artists Susan Brumm and Diane Stemper in inviting book artists to choose a text from the library's collection and use it as an inspiration for a new creation. The

online exhibit is a reproduction of the exhibit catalog and features color photographs of the artists' books, their statements, and the title of the Lloyd text that inspired the work. Introductions from co-curators, Brumm and Stemper, explore the relationship between science and art, making the case for a visual arts display within a scientific context.

Another improvement has recently been negotiated with the University of Cincinnati Libraries that makes searching Lloyd's holdings through UC's online catalog easier for our patrons. Accessed from our website, Lloyd's catalog records have been available through UC's UCLID

online catalog for several years, although up in inrecently it was not possible to search only Lloydholdings. One can now change location to the Lloyd-Library and Museum before searching, which eliminates holdings from other UC libraries or affiliates and returns results only from the Lloyd.

Other enhancements have been made to simplify access and provide for more content. For instance, there is a separate section for Lloyd news which includes information about events and exhibits, feature articles and headlines, as well as all press releases issued from the Lloyd. There is also an expanded section for the Lloyd Scholar with more information about his publications, projects, activities, and a biographical sketch. Our history found in "About Us" now includes all Lloyd Showcases written by our scholar, which provide supplementary chapters of the library's past, highlighting several different biographical aspects of founder John Uri Lloyd.

## Lloyd Library Exhibit


#### Travel

## In the literature and on the web

Guide to 'Neurotica' charts new age of anxiety Last Updated: 2005-02-03 13:32:56 -0400 (Reuters Health) By Jill Serjeant

LOS ANGELES (Retiters) - Remember the time when people made stupid mistakes instead of "bad choices, when anal-retentive personalities were simply tidy and no one needed a "life coach?"

Gone are the days when "closure" was a term used for zippers and when "denial" was only a river in Lyypt.

Welcome to the new Age of Anxiety where Western culture is beset by so much dread that "bad habits have been turned into diseases, foibles are afflictions and sins are syndromes," says writer Jon Winokur.

Direct from California — the state that in 1986 created a task-force to promote self-esteem -- comes Winokut's "Encyclopedia Neurotica," an irreverent guide to the world of neuroses, phobias and a slew of other conditions just waiting to be chronicled in the next best-selling "addiction memoir..."

Winokur makes a clear distinction in the book between neurosis in the colloquial sense and psychosis that icu e to criminal behavior or demands hospitalization and is no laughing matter.

His "issues" are mostly with the "psychobabble" that has turned juvenile definquents into kids suffering from conduct disorder" and gluttons into "compulsive over-eaters..."

"We seem to mediculize oddity and quirkiness. I also wanted to try to make the point that, as actress Carrie Fisher said, 'All the good people are nuts.' This is what makes life so interesting." Winokur told Reuters ...

Some old disorders have gone distinctly out of fashion, says Winokur, notably nymphomania, once used to describe excessive female lust and now "a term rendered obsolete by the sexual revolution."

# Information Literacy Makes All the Wrong Assumptions

The premise of information literacy is that the supply of information has become overwhelming, and that students need a rigorous program of instruction in research or library-use skills, provided wholly or in part by librarians... Librarians should not assume that college students welcome their help in doing research online. The typical freshman assumes that she is already an expert user of the Internet... Google provides her with material she finds good enough, and does so instantaneously... Information literacy. Initiates the real threat of

the Internet altogether -- which is that it is now sufficiently simple and powerful that students can gradiant without ever using the library... Information literacy is also harmful because it encourages librarians to teach ways to deal with the complexity of information retrieval, rather than to try to reduce that complexity. One alternative to information literacy is ... The model of reading and writing [which] suggests that the hibrarians educational role is analogous to that of the professor in the classroom: Librarians should use their expertise to deepen students' understanding of the disciplines they study... to teach apprentice readers and writers. The library's educational function would be to make students better writers... a function that creates real value within our institutions.

We conducted a surreptitious, prospective, cohort study to explore how often physicians nod of) during scientific meetings and to examine risk factors for nodding off. After counting the number of heads falling forward during 2 days of lectures, we calculated the incidence density curves for nodding-off episodes per lecture (NOELs) and assessed risk factors using logistic regression analysis. In this article we report our eye-opening results and suggest ways speakers can try to avoid losing their audience.

The phenomenon described in this well-documented paper is not the exclusive preserve of physicians. Those attending library meetings will quickly recognize the similarity between our professions in this respect
